August Meetings—Helen Kelley Retrospective

Helen Kelley was a founding member of Minnesota Quilters in 1978, and she was the 1998 MQ Quilter of the Year. In 2008 she was inducted into the Quilters Hall of Fame. This month we continue to commemorate her contribution to quilters everywhere. She was an innovative quilter ahead of her time, as she used fiber and thread to interpret her world and the people in it. The delight of her quilts comes from looking closely enough to discover her sense of humor and her artist's eye for detail. And don't be fooled by only taking in the front of the quilt, as she often couldn't resist continuing the story on the back or adding a surprise element.



Join us Thursday, August 3, at 7 p.m. on Zoom for a closer look at the Helen Kelley Retrospective collection. You may have seen some of these quilts displayed in Special Exhibits at this year's show, but maybe you didn't have time to read all the gallery cards. Helen's quilts contained many layers of fabric and meaning. As her daughters combed through her letters and Loose Threads columns in Quilter's News-letter Magazine, they were able to describe in Helen's own words the story each quilt told. With the help of Helen's notes and information from her induction into the Quilter's Hall of Fame, Laura Nagel will explore several of her artistic and charming works. This program will be recorded for future viewing.

On Saturday, August 5, at 10 a.m., Jo Lee, one of Helen's daughters, will present a trunk show featuring several of Helen's quilts, including some that were not on view in Special Exhibits. She will take you behind the scenes of how her mother worked and where she got her inspiration. She will share some of the family sto-


ries that each quilt tells. This is a wonderful opportunity to see these delightful quilts in person before they are returned to their current homes.

Quilting for Others receives many beautiful placemats throughout the year. We donate them to centers which provide meals to the homebound twice a year. Around Christmas time, we donate the placemats we have been given to centers around the Twin Cities. During the MQ Show each year in June, we donate some to a center in the host city as a way of helping their community. This year we had some communication problems, and the placemats were not donated. Sometime after the show, we connected with Saint Cloud Catholic Charities, and we donated 278 placemats to them after the quilt show. The picture doesn't do justice to how interesting and colorful they are, and I am sure they will brighten the day for many lucky recipients. Thanks to all who donated placemats. Directions are available here: https://www.mnquilt.org/documents/Placemats.pdf. Many people start with leftover blocks and add sashing to make it the needed size. Get creative and see what you can do.

Also in the last month, we donated to Minnesota Visiting Nurses Association five kid's quilts and 29 baby quilts. Vinland Center received six twin quilts for their male residents, and Tubman was glad to get 26 twin quilts. It is so interesting to watch the trends in what is donated each week. Until about six to nine months ago, baby quilts outnumbered twin quilts about ten to one. Lately, I am seeing many more twin quilts than baby quilts come in. I don't know why that is, but we are grateful for all the quilts we get.

Summertime is a slow time at QFO, and we have fewer helpers due to vacations, etc., so we will not have an August Workday. We will resume them again in September. We will continue with our weekly Wednesday pick up and drop off events, and we always welcome anyone who wants to come and sew or cut or do whatever needs doing. Keep on sewing!

Attendance was comparable to past years; the vendors had positive comments, and the class offerings were well received. Following the show, we ask each show committee for a report to help us learn what went well and where we need to make changes. We also send survey requests to everyone who participated in or attended the show. If we have your e-mail address, please respond to our survey request.

In the meantime, we will rest on our laurels for a job well done. I must give heartfelt thanks to Brenda, Rose, Yvonne, the show committee, our staff, our board members and everyone who volunteered at the show. Every year we work hard to showcase great quilts, great classes, and great vendors. Special thanks as well to our sponsors, vendors, teachers and to everyone who entered a quilt for the exhibits. Well done.

Was the show a financial success? I can give you a short answer: We don't know—not yet. That may seem strange, but it takes about two months to close out the books. We pay the instructors and lecturers, settle with sponsors and vendors and add up any on-site revenues for our own activities, like merchandise, the silent auction, the MQP sales, etc. We also close out the bills with the convention center, on-site security and hotel. It just takes time.

When all is said and done, we are happy to get a 2 to 3% return. This year's results? Time will tell. Next month we will issue the annual report for 2022, and we will schedule a meeting for those who want to understand the inner workings of all we do at Minnesota Quilters, Inc.

You've seen those super heroes in the red aprons at the quilt show, right? Have you always envied how much fun they were having and the sense of pride they take in their tasks? Have you been amazed at how the quilt show comes together with just three part-time staff and lots of volunteers?

Now is your chance to become one of those superheroes. The 2024 show committee will be launching in September. We need people to serve on a wide variety of subcommittees. Some are more intense than others, some happen primarily at the show and others have work to do throughout the months before the show. We have job descriptions for the committees plus reports from past volunteers, so you won't start from scratch. In most cases, two people work together. See the positions and descriptions and the signup at SignUpGenius. If you want to serve but are not sure the best area, there is a slot for that as well.

If you have served on the Show Committee and are ready to share your leadership skills, please consider the Show Coordinator role. This can be easily shared with another person, and we actually encourage it. You'll work closely with the Show Director, Brenda Lyseng, to shape the show as a whole, fill in when work needs to be done, and guide certain subcommittees.

The Show Committee will meet via Zoom on the fourth Saturday of the month from 9 to 10:30 a.m. Meetings are recorded so timing is not a hindrance.

The Minnesota Quilt Show: How did it go?

To sum it up in one word: GREAT.

Our planning and work paid off as set up and take down went smoothly, the show flowed well without major hiccups, and everyone seemed to be having a fun time. Behind the scenes can always be a different story, but this year it truly was smooth. No drapes fell, no one was injured, the vendors were easy to work with, and other than all the credit cards forgotten at vendor booths, it was success. We have several goals for the show.

Offer educational experiences for quilters of all types.

We offered 38 workshops and 12 lectures, and we had seven presentations on the Learning Stage. The fill rate for classes was 74%. Student ratings of the workshops were shared with faculty. Overall, participants rated their workshop as above average or excellent. They gave feedback on the supply list, the pacing, getting questions answered, the value of the workshop and ideas for improvement. Comments included:

Inspiring and mind-blowing ~ Teacher was entertaining, but even better, a great instructor ~ It was a happy class ~ Very thought provoking ~ Loved this workshop with many actual antique quilts ~ She was charming and attentive and spent time with each of us individually ~ Very personable. It is quite gracious of her to share how she creates her art quilts rather than keeping it a secret ~ Best class, teacher well prepared and knowledgeable.

Invite and build relationships with quilters.

Several guilds participated in our Guild Table–enough so that we expanded from last year. We offered the See and Sew activity on Saturday and invited beginners to make a microwave cozy using handcrank sewing machines. The Scavenger Hunt included questions for adults as well as for youth. The overall rating for the quilt show among advanced registrants was 4.51 out of 5. We asked our advance registrants what brought them to the show and if they met new people.

I attend almost every year, with a few friends from my small quilt group ~ We met a few new folks at the banquet, so that was fun. ~ The show is something I look forward to each year. I go to be inspired, to learn about new tools and techniques and to connect. It's a good chance to connect as I usually make arrangements to go with friends and often run into other people I know. ~ Getting to know people through volunteering. It's such a great opportunity! ~ My sister and I have been attending for decades. We drive down from Thunder By, Ontario, Canada, and always have a wonderful time. Just keep up the excellent work! ~ What got the ball rolling to get me to the show was winning a three-day registration pass as a door prize at one of the MQ Zoom meetings, and I was so glad to be there, from viewing quilts, vendor purchases, donated to the small quilt auction, great daylong class, and volunteering in the QFO booth – such a fun way to interact with other quilters! And being an MQ Zoomer, I did meet some MQ members I have only see on Zoom. I am so appreciative of the efforts made to keep the Zoom option for those of us a distance away.

Expose the general public to the art of quilting.

We don't know how many attendees were not quilters, but we did advertise beyond the quilting world in newspapers, on radio, and on a billboard.

Celebrate the quilt entrants and ribbon awardees.

During Preview Night we again announced the winners of the Judged Competition. New this year was broadcasting the announcements live on Facebook. Quilt entrants rated the process of entering their quilts at 4.5, dropping off or shipping their entries at 4.5, and picking up quilts 4.58 out of 5.

My first time entering judged was a good experience! ~ Thank you for giving me the pleasure of entering! ~ I think the quilts are displayed very well ~ This show committee really has made your show procedures into a well-oiled machine. Thank you for all the extra attention to details...Such as the inclusiveness of seeing the award presentation on FB, the e-mail letting me know when my quilt shipped etc. Thank you! ~ I loved seeing mu quilt hanging at the show! It was treated wonderfully, and looked great. Thank you!

Generate revenue for Minnesota Quilters.

Attendance this year was about 3,500 different people. Of those 546 had multi-day admissions. These numbers are similar to last year's. Thursday had the highest daily ticket sales of 1,200. More on this after we finish paying bills.

Support the vendors so they have a successful show.

We had fewer vendors due to a competing biennial show in Kansas City. For vendors that had signed up early, we offered an additional ½ booth at low cost to fill the space and allow them to bring more products. The Pattern Designer Showcase was offered for the first time to give pattern designers a less costly option of participating by sharing booth space in our MQ Merchandise booth. They paid a lower fee, we handled sales, and MQ kept a 25% commission. Six designers participated and were so pleased with the exposure and the sales. We added snacks to the vendor lounge and many of them commented favorably on that. Vendors rated the show 3.96 out of 5 for meeting their financial goals, 4.48 for receiving the information they needed, and 4.61 for organization. We know that Preview Night is not of value to them, and we continue to consider new options. What did vendors like about the show?

Volunteers were amazing! ~ New experience for me, I liked everything. ~ The venue, the mix of quilt-related vendors, all of the volunteers and staff. ~ It was a great place for connections and networking. ~ Jean and Charlotte were so very helpful! ~ Truly enjoyed the show and the attendance was great. ~ Great experience, and I am planning on being there next year!

Provide a satisfying experience for committee members.

Volunteers are crucial for the success of our show! If you haven't already done so, make sure you say thanks to a committee member! Many committee members and others had a fun stroll through downtown St. Cloud on our Quilt Walk Tuesday evening. Pizza dinner on Wednesday was fun, and we enjoyed inviting the faculty to join us.

Judged Committee Show Report judged@mnquilt.org

As mentioned in a previous newsletter, The Minnesota Quilt Show was a partner show with the National Association of Certified Quilt Judges (NACQJ) this year. This means that judges certified by the NACQJ judged the quilts in St. Cloud, and individuals who are in the process of becoming certified quilt judges came to Minnesota to observe and volunteer with the judging procedure.

Why did the NACQJ return to partner with The Minnesota Quit Show a second time? Because the Minnesota Quilt Show has the reputation of being an excellent show!

There were more than 20 certified judge candidates who came to St. Cloud, some from as close as Minnesota, Wisconsin, Iowa and North Dakota, but others came from as far away as Tennessee, North Carolina, Texas, Arizona and California.

They were very glad to have the opportunity to observe the judging process before the show opened, and those who stayed for the show made many favorable comments about the show. They were impressed with the quality of the quilts in both the judged exhibit and all the special exhibits, the great variety of vendors, and all the classes, lectures, and activities offered. Many mentioned taking ideas they learned here back to their own guilds to improve their shows. Some of the judging candidates were able to help decide the special Minnesota Awards, and those who did were very grateful to have that experience.

Do you like to BEE together?

I was talking with Mea Clift, Membership Co-Director, about the delight we get when we meet another quilter. I've been quilting for about 15 years. This hobby has rippled through my life to include working at a quilt shop, going on retreats and working with the MQ board. I belong to three guilds, and I meet for sewing time with at least five different groups of friends. It should be no surprise that my vacations have included visits to other quilt shows and quilt museums. During COVID I planned and participated in different Zoom N Stitch days. My passion for quilting just grows and grows.

I've also worried about the perception that Minnesota Quilters is too big and has too many cliques. The perception is that we aren't a welcoming space. I hate to think that is true, but I also know that feeling. I hate walking into a room with 100 people where nobody says hello. It's not a good feeling.

I think if we started to turn those cliques into small groups or quilting BEES, we could all get to know each other just a little bit better.
