

President's Letter

This past month has turned quite cold so it's no surprise that I'm wrapped in a quilt, thinking about Minnesota Quilters. MQ is 45 years old. If you are of that age, you will recognize the desire to re-engineer, change direction, and think about what you were meant to do going forward, and the Board is doing just that. We're retaining the best of our early years, integrating the changes of recent years, and re-directing our energy toward being the best MQ can be.

MQ is an organization with two parts: The Show and the Community. We have these three goals: 1) quilters teaching quilters; 2) celebrating our creativity through the show and 3) giving back to our communities. As quilters, we thrive when we make connections, practice our craft, and use those talents to give back to our communities.

As a new member in 2008, I felt a bit lost. It took a long time to feel welcome. I volunteered to help on a project where I knew I could contribute. Then I found a friend, who introduced me to other friends. It's those friendships that connect me to MQ.

Here's my view of our past, present and possible future:

Past: We began in 1978 as a group of 30+ women who decided to share their quilting passion and talents with each other. This quickly expanded to include a vision for a state-wide organization and an annual show. Our membership expanded to reach our current 823 members. As a large organization, we also created a large bureaucracy with many volunteer job descriptions, bylaws, board manuals, policies, etc. It's both amazing and overwhelming.

Present: MQ is very big and it's hard to feel welcomed in such a large organization, so that's an ongoing concern. We envision using Zoom to work with other guilds to deliver state-wide programs, and we need to connect across the state to make this happen. Zoom is terrific but it will be better if we have a better network of helpers to make it happen.

Future: Here's our key issue- we need to make our community stronger. With day retreats, weekend retreats, monthly meetings and workshops consistently selling out, we see a craving for engagement, learning and growth. There are lots of opportunities through Minnesota Quilters and your "closer to home" guild(s) for sew-ins, demonstrations, beginning to quilt days, and even just sharing a meal and some projects together. Our membership team and our President-Elect (interim director of communities) have lots of grand ideas for sharing the wonderful art of quilting at MQ and throughout greater Minnesota. But we need your help. We want you to be excited and compelled to participate in this community of crafters. Community is standing with each other, helping within and without, to elevate what we do. We want you to be part of the fun.

The Minnesota Quilt Show can be one of the best in the country, and we might be the biggest guild in the state, but we cannot survive without your help, your skills, your joy, and passion for quilting. Please consider contributing some time and skills to these wonderful volunteer opportunities, attending outside events, and more. We are so glad you're part of Minnesota Quilters and thank you for your membership, your participation, and for reading.

Minnesota Quilt Project

Laura Nagel has been attracted to fabric for as long as she can remember and has always been sewing something. Her journey into quilting began in the 1980s when she inherited an unfinished Crazy Quilt from her great grandmother. At the time, Laura was restoring a home with a parlor and knew the quilt would be the perfect accessory. She also knew that it would need to be finished if it was going to survive, so she soon found herself signed up for a class on borders at the local fabric/craft store in Colorado. She loved the class and, as they say, "The rest is history – she had become a quilter."

Laura went on to inherit several more antique quilts from her family – Dresden Plate blocks and a velvet Flying Geese quilt. Laura's grandmother even remembered her own mother sitting on the porch working on the velvet quilt using leftover



tailors' scraps bought from a traveling merchant. Laura has continued to purchase and collect many antique quilts over the years, each with stories of their own.

Laura has a particular interest in the history of quilts. That love was inspired by a class she took from Kaye England at the Country Peddler on Civil War Quilts. For Laura, it is the history of the fabrics combined with the untold history of the maker. As a Librarian, Laura knows that there was not a lot of history written about women but that often they told their stories through their crafts, including quilting.

Laura finds traditional quilts most appealing. She loves the choosing of fabric and has quite a stash of fabrics. She also loves every aspect of the construction process from the piecing to the joining of the blocks to squaring up the top to applying the binding. She says that seeing the blocks come together is like bringing a puzzle together to completion. The only aspect Laura no longer does is the actual quilting. Laura says she now "quilts by check." Laura prefers machine piecing vs handwork. She is still working on her first hand-quilted piece from the 80s. She is a gadget person – she likes the right tool for the job. "A good tool makes for a good outcome."

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When asked what impact quilting has had on Laura's life, she responded, "It keeps me broke! I have more fabric in my stash than furniture updates in my home." But the greatest impact to her has been the connec- 🕿 tions she has made within the community of quilters. Laura has made friendships she feels will endure long after she has given up the hobby of quilting. Laura is a life-long learner. She enjoys taking classes and even likes the technology aspect such as learning things about a new sewing machine. She feels learning expands her horizons in every way.

Laura was a Librarian at Eagan High School for many years. In 1995, the MQ Show was held at the Eagan School. Laura decided the library would be the perfect place to

display several quilts as the backdrop for the Meet the

Teachers event. It was so well-received that it became the impetus for Laura to continue to hang quilts again. She chose March, Women's History Month, and featured a different MN quilter each year. She started with just a few quilts and, as the years went by, the show grew to a display of 60-80 quilts and continued for 20 years.

In conjunction with the library show each year, the Women's Literature class started a prevailing theme of women's needlework and students made a quilt block representing their life. Students earned extra credit for quilting the blocks together which took place in the library. This act of students coming together to quilt impacted their lives. Laura says she saw girls from various cliques come together at the quilting frame and talk with each other. A true testament that quilting brings us together. The library quilt shows also brought the community at large together as they anticipated each year's show.

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In closing, Laura states that it is important that we pass the wonderful art of quilting on to the next generations. Laura taught her daughter to sew and is now teaching her grandchildren to sew. One of Laura's granddaughters even won a sewing machine for entering her unique design in the youth exhibit at an MQ show. Quilting has given Laura a life of fulfillment. "That is the part of the legacy that needs to be passed on generation to generation."

Quilt Show Task Force: What were the recommendations?

Brenda Lyseng showdirector@mnquilt.org This past fall, I convened a task force for the purpose of making recommendations regarding the future of The Minnesota Quilt Show. The goals were to make recommendations concerning the location and venue, the frequency and dates, and the scope of the show. We had rich conversations and deep dives into data. I hope these highlights get you thinking and dreaming as well!

Why do we have a quilt show?

Quilts: the show boosts people's confidence by giving them a chance to show their quilts; allows us to see quilts made in Minnesota and beyond; opens up our world as to what is possible. Education: the show helps us gain proficiency and gain access to nationally known faculty. Vendors: quilters see new products that their local store may not have, vendors gain new customers and income. Exposure: opportunity to interest the general public in quilting arts. Social: the show gives a sense of community and chance to socialize, local quilt guilds connect with potential new members. Financial: profit from the show supports other MQ activities.

What trends do we see nationally?

The demographic of attendees, faculty, and vendors continues to age and some have 'stepped out.' Outside factors, especially COVID, had a large impact. Younger quilters are very engaged in the industry but not necessarily attending shows. We need to strive to attract younger quilters, ethnically diverse populations, and other fiber artists.

Are we fulfilling our mission?

We should continue focusing on inclusivity, creativity, accessibility, and collaboration. We want to keep the show affordable, our venue accessible, and collaborate with other fiber arts organizations. *Continued on next page.*

What does the data tell us?

We found our trends are similar to other shows (when data was public).

Attendance: has decreased from 4800-6000 to 3800 after COVID

Workshop fill rate: fill rate has steadily improved to around 76%

Net Revenue: difficult to see trends by location but the net revenue has decreased since COVID (i.e. \$117,000 in 2014 and \$30,000 in 2023)

Vendors: number of vendors has decreased (112 in 2018, 50 in 2023 when schedule conflict occurred with Kansas City Regional Quilt Festival)

The number of national quilt shows has decreased; QuiltCon, however is growing.

What are the options for venues?

Given the amount of space we need, there are only 5 options: DECC in Duluth, River's Edge in St. Cloud, Mayo Civic Center in Rochester, RiverCentre in St. Paul, and Minneapolis Convention Center. Net revenue was similar for the first 3 sites. Admission sales in 2007 in St. Paul were similar to other years. Recommend Request for Proposals to all 5 sites for future years.

What do we recommend for future show dates?

The task force recommended, and the Board approved, that we change the **2025** show to **June 19 – 21** in order to avoid a conflict with the Kansas City Regional Quilt Festival. We recommend continuing with an annual show in mid to late June.

What other recommendations were made?

We recommended that we broaden the appeal of the show to other fiber artists via the vendors chosen, workshops offered, and ways to connect with other fiber art organizations. Those recommendations are being implemented this year. Complimentary tickets will be added to each quilt shop/retreat center marketing packet. We will be offering quilters the opportunity to sell their exhibited quilts. We are unveiling The Connection, an area for fiber art organizations and affinity groups to meet.

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Are you working on your BQ5 Challenge?

In case you missed the announcements of the Maple Island BQ Nation Challenge, here's a recap of the details:

Debbie Bowles, the owner of Maple Island Quilts, generously offered to donate 20 of her patterns to MQ. We thought it would be fun to get 20 copies of the same pattern, and offer them to members who would be interested in making them as part of an exhibit at the show. Thus, the idea of a challenge was born.

We chose BQ5 because it had, in our opinion, the most opportunity for original interpretation. It features an 18.5" block, comprised of a 12.5" focus square with a

pinwheel or accent splash. Perfect for showcasing large scale prints, or small panel squares. Won't it be fun to see how each member takes the pattern and makes it their own. The pattern also has a smaller block option, if that better fits your style.

There really will be no specific rules to the challenge, other than participants must use a BQ pattern from Maple Island Quilts, **preferably** BQ5 or BQ5 Encore. And of course, that the quilts be completed in time for them to be entered in the 2024 MQ Show in Duluth. We have set up a category for you to enter them in quilt entry registration.

During our Saturday September School House meeting last year we pulled names out of the hat for the 20 Free BQ5 Patterns.

Judged Quilts Q&A

Q: Can I enter a quilt made from someone else's pattern, or does every quilt have to be an original design?

A: Yes. You can enter quilts made from someone's pattern. Find the category that best fits the size and technique of your quilt (contact judged@mnquilt.org if you need help deciding). The judges will look at how well you put the elements of your quilt together, whether you designed it or not.

Q: Can I enter a quilt that I made from a kit?

A: Yes. There is a special category for kit quilts, Block of the Month quilts. etc. It is the **Workmanship** category. Here is the definition:

Any Row by Row, Mystery, Kit, or Quilt Shop Block of the Month quilts. It may include piecing or appliqué, and the work may be done by hand or machine. It may be completely constructed and quilted by one person, or the quilting may be done by a second person. Since many of the design and/or fabric decisions will have been made by someone other than the entrant, the judges will focus on workmanship or how well the entrant has used the given elements to create the finished quilt. This is a single category for one or two persons.

Q: How do I know what size each category is?

A: Here are our sizes:

All quilts have a maximum size of 110" x 110" or a perimeter of 440".

For the categories with large and small options, the perimeter determines the switchover. 280" is the minimum perimeter for a large quilt and it is the maximum perimeter for a small quilt. Traditionally, miniature quilts have a maximum perimeter of 96".

Q: Are there any new categories?

A: Yes. It is Upcycled quilts. Here is the definition:

Upcycled: This can be any quilt made with materials that were previously used for something else. This may include fabric used for clothing, upholstery, bags, napkins, placemats, tablecloths, or other cloth objects. It may also include old quilts that are re-imagined into a new configuration. The quilt can be of any style (pieced, applique, mixed, modern, art, pictorial) but must include at least 50% upcycled materials on the front of the quilt. This should be a flat quilt, not a freestanding sculpture or garment. The usual judging criteria will apply but special consideration will be given to creative use of materials. This is a single category for one or two persons.

Q: What is that new Miniature Award?

A: Rather than a miniature category, the judges will look at all the quilts entered into every category and determine if any show exemplary miniaturization. Characteristics of exemplary miniaturization are the use of scaled proportions. Thus, the blocks must be scaled to appear appropriately sized for a standard size quilt. The fabrics typically have small prints, the binding is narrow, and the stiches are small.

Q: Why should I enter a quilt in judged? My quilts can't possibly measure up to those award winners!

A: Both of your friendly judged quilt co-chairs agree that it can be a bit scary to have your pride and joy viewed by a bunch of strangers, especially when they are right next to some beautiful quilts. Yet, we have both done it with no regrets. The awards are nice, but they are not everything. The comments from the judges are very useful plus they'll appreciate what you did well. 



I wonder how many people remember that. I remember because I'm a pushover for a good layer cake.

One of my fondest memories was of the committee meeting in a crowded quilt shop where we sat on folding chairs, all facing front, in the aisles of shelves packed with fabric bolts. One of the members, who happens to be a first-grade teacher, started singing "The Wheels On the Bus Go Round and Round". We all joined in and were totally silly for a while. It was three months before the show opened and boy did we ever need some silliness!

The show itself went off without too many hitches. Oh yes, the little blue bridge between the DECC and the hotels did its occasional sulk and wickedly refused to go down just when the show ended and the teachers were trundling all their sewing machines, quilt samples and class supplies back to Canal Park. It's a long way around without benefit of the Little Blue Bridge.

With ballet and opera performances, quilt shows and meetings, I had spent so many hours at the DECC, working back behind the scenes, in the arena, the exhibit Halls, Fitzgerald Food Hall, ballrooms, classrooms, concrete alleyways and bathrooms, that I think I knew every square inch If I ever become a little old homeless person, I'm going to sneak into the complex and make myself right at home. Maybe no one will ever know I'm there. Leftover cold bratwurst could get a little tiresome, though.

Reminder-mark your calendars right now and join us at the Minnesota Quilt Show as we once again take over the DECC, June 13th through 15th, 2024. If you haven't been to a large quilt show, I guarantee you a good time. If you are thinking of your dear Grandmother and the quilts that she made, you will be stunned at the creativity quilters will be exhibiting. I know I was, when I attended my first quilt show and that's how this all happened.
